Site Area: 4.5 ha

Description:

An area of unimproved, semi-natural pasture displaying a remarkable and complex pattern of vegetation, including grassland, flush, bog and fen-like communities. A notable feature is the widespread occurrence of whorled caraway *Carum verticillatum*, a scarce umbelliferous plant found mainly in the unimproved grasslands of the Carmarthen Coalfield, but also in out-lying sites like this one and in others as far afield as Ceredigion and Radnor. This site displays well the range of conditions in which whorled caraway will grow - here it can be seen growing in both moderately damp grassland and in very wet flush and bog areas, where it occurs on raised hummocks within a carpet of bog-mosses *Sphagnum spp*.

The centre of the site is very wet and has swamp communities dominated by branched burreed Sparganium erectum or common cottongrass Eriophorum angustifolium; small sedge mires with carnation sedge Carex panicea, common yellow-sedge C demissa, round-leaved sundew Drosera rotundifolia and common butterwort Pinguicula vulgaris; flushes containing bog-mosses and sedges, and others with bog-mosses, purple moor-grass Molinia caerulea, deergrass Trichophorum cespitosum and cross-leaved heath Erica tetralix; and stream lines lined with hemlock water-dropwort Oenanthe crocata and greater tussock-sedge Carex paniculata. Other notable plants growing in this wet central area include marsh St. John'swort Hypericum elodes, white beak-sedge Rhynchospora alba, ivy-leaved bellflower Wahlenbergia hederacea, marsh arrowgrass Triglochin palustris, bog pimpernel Anagallis tenella, marsh-marigold Caltha palustris, bog asphodel Narthecium ossifragum, ragged-robin Lychnis flos-cuculi, marsh violet Viola palustris, lesser skullcap Scutellaria minor, early marsh-orchid Dactylorhiza incarnata and bogbean Menyanthes trifoliata. This wet area grades into drier herb-rich pasture which is varied in nature and contains such species as meadow thistle Cirsium dissectum, devil's-bit scabious Succisa pratensis, petty whin Genista anglica, dyer's greenweed G. tinctoria, saw-wort Serratula tinctoria, tormentil Potentilla erecta, common spotted-orchid Dactylorhiza fuchsii and heath spotted-orchid D.maculata sub species ericetorum.

The fauna of the site has yet to be studied in any detail, but some uncommon insects are known to be present. Two scarce dragonflies, mainly restricted to south-west Britain, have been recorded in the flushed areas, namely the keeled skimmer *Orthetrum coerulescens* and the blue-tailed damselfly *Ischnura pumilio*. Also recorded are two notable butterflies, the

marsh fritillary *Eurodryas aurinia* and the small pearl-bordered fritillary *Boloria selene*, and also the day-flying scarlet tiger moth *Callimorpha dominula*.

The site lies within the Brecon Beacons National Park.

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
